August Trip Report

Under cloudy skies, 25 Mountaineers and guests gathered for a trip up Red Cone, Radical Hill and Saints John trails. We stopped at the trail head to air down and lock in before proceeding up the rocky trail. With the wet month that we had, the wild flowers were still blooming all along the trail. The day was cool so we didn't expect to have any vapor locking as we had on the last two trips.

When we broke out of the trees and onto the tundra, we stopped to gather up our group which had gotten strung out and to watch the few Jeeps ahead of us snake their way up Little Rascal Hill. We also had to wait only a few minutes for Matt to change a broken u-joint.



Up on top of Red Cone (12,804 feet), we ate lunch and took in the spectacular views in all directions. In the distance we could see that Radical Hill had just received some fresh snow. We also saw several vehicles below us coming up Webster Pass. Before lunch was over it



had started to spit snow on us from time to time.

sidelings and the steep shelf road we were climbing. To add to the mix was the melting snow running down the road which was making some good mud.



After stopping at the top to take pictures and to shake out our pant legs, we headed up to the Saints John Trail. After going over the steep climb on Glacier Mountain and past the General Teller

Mine, we were finally headed down hill towards the timberline and the Wild Irishman Mine. When we

got to the Townsite of Saints John, we knew that the end of the trail was just a few minutes away in Montezuma. We stopped to air up our tires and congratulate ourselves on having no major breakdowns to slow us up. As it was, we would not get back home until after 7:00 pm that evening. On the way up Loveland Pass, Darwin lost 3rd gear in his trusty CJ-7.

Georgetown and his trailer for the trip home. It would be fair to say that it was another spectacular day of wheeling with the Mountaineer family.



Miscellaneous meanderings of Craig's confused mush mind.

Anniversaries and birthdays are normally a time of reflection for me. When I joined the Mountaineers back in June of 1984, little did I know how involved I would become, let alone that I would be elected president 8 times! The club was founded in August of 1965 and is still going strong after 40 years so we must be doing something right. Back in 1964, the Forest Service initiated RARE I and then RARE II (Roadless Area Review and Evaluation), the forerunner to what we know as wilderness areas today. The club was formed not only to promote safe 4 wheeling among like minded people, but also as a political entity to try to protect and save the forests 4WD roads that we already had access to. The founders of the club thought that RARE I & II would close some of those public roads.

When I joined, I had been wheeling on my own for about 2 years in a stock Toyota FJ-40. I soon learned how little I knew about our “sport”. At that time virtually no one had lockers, 6 inch lifts or fuel injection that we take for granted today. I remember how some of the more

experienced members would tell me how to “read the rocks” to be able to finesse my way through tough spots on the trail (some still think that I haven't learned the art of airing down). Our club was as family oriented back then as it is today. Our current longest club members, George & Alice Kinnison, joined the Mountaineers in 1966. Their kids, Bob and Ken, grew up in the back seat of a CJ-5. Ken finally grew up, married Donna and had a family of their own. Now, Cory and Cody have grown up in the back seat of a CJ-7 and the kids also have caught the 4 wheeling bug. Cory got his drivers license and is chomping at the bit to get his own jeep built and trail ready. Cody can't be that far behind. It's amazing, three generations of Mountaineers. Come to think of it, the Kappermans already have three generations of wheelers out on the trails.

Being single, the Mountaineers are my family. I have met and wheeled with the best and the most unique people on earth because of this club and contacts made through the Colorado State Association. The Schleppys introduced me to some people from England. They have wheeled with us several times and I was fortunate enough to have gone to an event in Wales three times to wheel with them. I also have gotten to go to Canada and Nicaragua because of friendships made through the club. The Gollys befriended a CSU student from Iceland and Mike jumped at the chance to wheel with the Iceland club across the glaciers for several days. The Horners befriended some people on the

trail and wound up wheeling with them in Tasmania. You never know who you will meet out on the trail and where it will take you.

Our club does a lot of good work out on the trails. This year alone, we have put in 775 hours working on our Adopt-A-Trails for the Forest Service. The roadside in Poudre Canyon between mile markers 117 and 119 sure is clean thanks to the club members that volunteer four times a year on our Adopt-A-Highway program. We donate to COHVCO to keep our trails open and participate in the “Toys for Tots” program for kids less fortunate than our own.

There is nothing more fun than sitting around the campfire, swapping stories with some of your closest friends. It could also be taking first timers to Moab and watching the grins on their faces as they negotiate the “Golden Crack” unscathed or going through the “Chutes” on Kelly Flats without a scratch. The beauty of the forest and tundra along with the history of the areas that we travel through make it all worth while to me. The best is the comradely of wheeling anywhere on this earth with the Mountaineer Family.
