The Food Bank of Larimer County reduces hunger by distributing food to individuals and in cooperation with more than 70 agencies that serve those in need. In 2007, Food Bank distributed 5.6 million pounds of food to low-income residents in Larimer County, valued at more that \$9,400,000!

# Food Bank for Larimer County 2008 Fact Sheet

Staffed by 21 employees and supported by hundreds of volunteers, the Food Bank distributed 5 million pounds of food in 2006 to at-risk residents throughout Larimer County. Established in 1984, the Food Bank is the only America's Second Harvest clearinghouse for donated food in Larimer County.

#### **Service Provided**

#### **Food Share:**

The direct service pantry program is an important source of food for more than 8,000 low-income people each month, nearly on half are children and elderly. In 2007, more than 21,000 individuals were served through the two Food Share locations in Ft. Collins and Loveland.

#### **Food Link:**

A source of food for approximately 70 Larimer County nonprofit member agencies that serve the hungry, the Food Bank saved these agencies nearly \$2 million on food expenses in 2007.

#### **Resources Needed**

#### **Food Sources:**

The Food Bank collects donated food from community food drives, local and national manufactures, distributors, grocers, growers, restaurants and the government.

#### **Funding:**

At 38%, our largest source of income comes from individual donors. Additional funding comes from foundations(16%); member agencies through shared maintenance(transportation and handling) fees;(8%); the United Way (5%); special fund raising events (10%); the government (8%); faith communities (4%); corporations (4%); and other activities (7%).

**Volunteers:** In 2007, more than 1,400 volunteers contributed hours.



#### **Land Use Committee**

The Colorado Association of 4WD Clubs Land Use Committee is dedicated to the protection of public access to public lands.

Many of the member clubs of the Colorado Association have adopted roads and do volunteer projects on lands that are managed by the BLM and the Forest Service to stop the lost mileage from road closures. Through these agreements they are able to maintain public access by doing maintenance, mitigating problems related to resource damage, and by rehabilitating existing infrastructures. Through these efforts the clubs reduce impacts to the environment and support the managing agencies in keeping access available to the public. Annually the clubs document thousands of volunteer hours on their Adopt-A-Roads and volunteer projects on the public lands across Colorado.

Another way to influence the management of the public lands is to become involved with the Forest Service District, or BLM Resource Area near you. Many scope projects are done on the public lands each year, and your comments are important. Also, giving comments during the Forest Planning process is another important way to influence the future management of our public lands.


